has grown



The Forest Preserve District has new additions, and plans to expand the native prairie and add a bird sanctuary at the Shannon Bayou site. The board and staff at the Preserve are very happy to announce the addition of a 49.5 wooded area to the Heiland Land and Water Preserve. The land purchase and the expansion of the prairie and butterfly garden at Shannon Bayou are major steps in furthering the District's mission to preserve open space, protect natural areas, develop areas for outdoor recreation and provide environmental education for people of all ages. With the expansion of the native prairie site and addition of a bird sanctuary, visitors can get a glimpse of the great diversity and variation of the vast prairies that once covered the Midwestern landscape.

There are now 7 Kankakee River Valley forest Preserve sites. One brand new one,
